'Chief American Middle East Negotiator Dennis Ross recorded that President Clinton lashed out at Arafat, yelling that he had "been here fourteen days and said no to everything." (Ross) At one point, near the end of the summit after Arafat's final rejection, Clinton reportedly banged on the table in anger, and said: "You are leading your people and the region to a catastrophe." Mister President,

Security Council resolution 2334 (2016) calls on Israel to "immediately and completely cease all settlement activity in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem" and to "fully respect all of its legal obligations in this regard." Settlement activity has, nevertheless, continued....

...Demolitions and seizures of Palestinian-owned structures continued across the occupied West Bank, including East Jerusalem. Citing the lack of Israeli-issued building permits, which are almost impossible for Palestinians to obtain, Israeli authorities, demolished, seized or forced people to demolish 238 structures, displacing 183 people, including 46 women and 91 children. 32 structures were donor funded.

...On 17 August, a Palestinian elementary school in Ein Samiya serving nearly 80 pupils was demolished days before the start of the school year. Fifty-nine schools, serving some 6,500 Palestinian students, are at risk of demolition.

In a continuing trend, many Palestinians, including children, left from their communities citing violence by settlers and shrinking grazing land...

' The following morning, however, it was Hamas that was celebrating. The polls had been wrong. Indeed, Hamas had won an overwhelming electoral victory. Frenzied supporters of the group, most known for its headline grabbing suicide bombing tactics against Israel chanted euphorically outside the Palestinian Legislative Council building. In a move that was seen as both disrespectful and audacious, the revelers raised the green Hamas flag over the building. Infuriated Fatah supporters tried to lower the banner. A 30 minute struggle ensued, with the two sides throwing stones and breaking windows until Palestinian security fired warning shots into the air.'

There must be a consensus on common values, respect for human rights and basic freedoms, equality between all citizens, and, above all, the right of children to food, clothing, education and freedom from fear...

Statement on 30th anniversary of infamous "Oslo Accords"



Thirty years have passed since the so-called Oslo Accords, which were orchestrated to serve the Israeli occupation and its settler colonial project. These agreements have inflicted nothing but more suffering, agony, and tragedies upon the Palestinian people.

Given the devastating aftermath of these accords, which have manifested in the loss of Palestinian lives, forced displacements, abductions, the occupation and seizure of our historic lands, and the ongoing efforts to Judaise Muslim and Christian holy sites, and in the midst of the escalating aggression and atrocities perpetrated by the Israeli occupation government against the Palestinian people, the Palestinian Islamic Resistance Movement Hamas states the following:

First: The Palestinian people's unwavering support for the resistance project conveys a clear message that resistance and struggle are the only way to achieve liberation and the establishment of a Palestinian state.

Second: We reiterate our firm stance against all agreements that compromise our principles and national rights and call on the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO) to recognise the failure of the "Oslo" accords and terminate them.

Third: We also call on the PLO to withdraw recognition of the Israeli occupation entity and work towards restructuring the Palestinian house and achieving national unity.

75 years after the Nakba:

- The weak and conspiratorial Arab role and the British Mandate were mainly responsible for the Nakba
- The split between the West Bank and the Gaza Strip is most damaging development that has happened to the Palestinian people since the Nakba followed by the occupation of the West Bank and Gaza Strip
- The best thing that has happened to the Palestinian people since the Nakba is the establishment of Islamic movements, the two intifadas, the establishment of the PLO and the establishment of the Palestinian Authority
- Two-thirds of the public do not fear a repeat of the Nakba 3
- Steadfastness on the land is the most important lesson of the Nakba
- 66% believe Israel will not celebrate its 100th anniversary and 51% believe that the Palestinian people will be able to recover Palestine in the future.

On the occasion of the Nakba, the overwhelming majority places the blame for it on non Palestinian parties while only 7% believe that the weakness of the Palestinian people is primarily responsible. The "weak and conspiratorial Arab role" comes first with 38%, followed by the British Mandate with 36%, and Zionist organizations and movements with 16%.

'To complicate matters, West Bank refugees of the conflict have flocked to Jordan over the last several decades and may now constitute a demographic majority in the country. The refugees' subsequent entrepreneurial and economic success has not endeared them to longstanding residents who accuse the newcomers of usurping jobs and resources. In recent years, Jordan's King Abdullah II has found it increasingly difficult to uphold even a vaguely defined "Arab consensus." During Israel's war with Hezbollah in 2006, for example, about half the Arab regimes openly supported Hezbollah, while Jordan, Egypt, and the Gulf states took a more moderate stance consistent with their ties to the United States and Israel. Abdullah faced much criticism for this decision at home, as public sentiment in Jordan and in the greater Arab world is overwhelmingly pro-Hezbollah.'
